USING STUDY TIME PRODUCTIVELY TO IMPROVE LEARNING

Students often ask for advice and ideas on how to study more productively... Some may find this method useful.

The SQ3RM Technique - Remembering What You Read

- 1. Survey the chapter you are going to read. Read the summary and the section headings.
- When you know what the chapter is about, write a list of the main questions that you would want to be able to answer if you had read the chapter.
- 3. Read the chapter with the questions in mind. Take brief notes that will allow you to formulate answers to these questions. It is often a good idea to read with a highlighter in hand so you can highlight key words and phrases.
- 4. Recite the questions and your answers to them when you have finished reading the chapter.
- 5. Review the chapter by skimming through it and checking that your answers to the questions were correct.

6. Structure the questions and the answers to them into a map. Put your map on the wall for a week. Look at it. Read it aloud. Trace it with your finger.



College Awareness Week Projects

Carndonagh Community School was the only school from Donegal to participate in College Awareness Week 2015 which was set up to encourage greater awareness in second-level schools of third level education institutions. The guidance department devised two projects to support College Awareness Week.

Ty students under the guidance of Ms. Roisin Diver worked on one of these projects called "Alumni Alma Maters" which involved surveying all teachers in the school and asking them where they went to college. The aim of these posters is to encourage students to ask teachers questions about these colleges.

Important Information for Parents on the HEAR and the DARE Access Programmes

Students and their parents who wish to be considered for a place in the ACCESS / HEAR scheme need to apply online on the CAO application website as part of their CAO application. You must register for CAO first, before you can apply for HEAR / DARE.

What are HEAR / DARE?

If you are not sure what the HEAR / DARE schemes are, please ask your son/daughter to show you the relevant information which is in the December Guidance Memo, sent by email. This email and the other documents sent with it explain HEAR / DARE will tell you if you are eligible or not. This short article does not explain this.

What do parents need to do?

Parents must take full responsibility for all aspects of the HEAR / DARE application. Parents should be aware that their children will not have all the information that is required to fill in the online HEAR/DARE application form and that parents will have to assist them in the process. We estimate that it could take 30 mins to an hour to fill in the details required - that is if you have all the financial information to hand.

What help have students been given?

Students have been given a link (sent by email) to download a HEAR and a DARE Application Booklet which will guide you through the online form step by step. This can also be accessed by going to www.accesscollege.ie and clicking **Downloads**.

What do I need to send by post?

Parents need to be aware that as well as filling in the form online, that a range of information will need to be sent to CAO by 1 April 2016. Some examples:

- If either Parent/Guardian is working: a P21 for <u>2014</u>
 from the tax office in Letterkenny (NB <u>NOT</u> 2015) must be sent in. <u>Tax documents from the wrong year will not be accepted.</u>
- If either Parent/Guardian is self-employed or involved in farming: a 'Notice of Assessment' for <u>2014</u> from the tax office must be sent in. <u>Tax documents from the wrong</u> year will not be accepted.
- If either Parent/Guardian is unemployed or in receipt of a social welfare allowance, then a statement of income for 2014 will be required from the Department of Social Protection in Buncrana. This form can be downloaded from the HEAR / DARE website: www.accesscollege.ie
- When posting documents to CAO, for HEAR / DARE you do not need to send the originals, photocopies will suffice.
- Bring your CAO handbook with you to the post office when you are posting the letter and get the post office to stamp one of the four certificates of postage inside the back cover of the CAO handbook.

Do you need any more help?

Further advice and help may possibly be obtained from your Social Protection Local Office in Buncrana (074) 932 0075 or from the Citizens' Information Services Office in the County Council Offices, Malin Road, Carndonagh. Tel: (074) 937 3728.

Guidance Counsellors in the school will, as always assist students with their CAO choices and the CAO application process, but it must be stressed that they are not in a

position to offer assistance with regard to the HEAR

Application, due to the large amount of private and financial information required by HEAR.

The SEN Coordinator and individual resource teachers in the school will assist DARE applicants with their application forms.

DARE and HEAR Advice Clinic Saturday 16th January
There will be a HEAR / DARE Advice Clinic for Parents who
need help filling in the forms or with finding the supporting
documents. It will be held in the Villa Rose Hotel, Main St.,
Ballybofey on Saturday January 10th from 10am until 2pm.
HEAR /DARE advisers will meet parents / guardians and
students on a one-to-one confidential basis. No booking
required.

CAO will also operate a helpline to assist with the applicant on making an application to HEAR / DARE until 1st March 2015. The helpline phone number is: 091 509800.

Home Economics Trip to National Craft & Design Fair (RDS)

On Friday, 4th December, Second Year Home Economics pupils travelled to Dublin for the National Craft & Design Fair at the RDS. The trip is an important part of the Junior Cert syllabus as it assists them in designing their own project craft work. The pupils were introduced to a variety of traditional and contemporary crafts and engaged with many of the exhibitors. There were a number of Inishowen craftspeople in attendance. A number of the exhibitors commented on the exemplary behaviour of our pupils. A great day was had by all.

American Exchange 2015

We left Carndonagh at 3am on 18th October to go to Dublin Airport. The bus seemed to take forever as we were all excited about the trip, when we arrived at Dublin Airport we checked in our bags and headed for security, then emigration. We all then boarded the plane together, and had an 8 hour flight to Charlotte, North Carolina. When we arrived in Charlotte we had about an hour until our flight to Saint Louis, so we could go get

something to eat or just walk about. Laura and I went to Starbucks because we are 'basic' and then we walked around the airport and got something to eat. When we arrived in Saint Louis everybody was nervous about meeting their exchange student. When we met them we got photos taken and went to get our suitcases. Afterwards, we went to our house. That night we didn't do much because we were tired but we met up with other students in the exchange and their hosts to get food. During the day we went on trips with the exchange students. Throughout the 10 days we went to the Rec. Plex, got a tour around the jail, met the mayor, took a boat ride on the Mississippi River and went to The Gateway Arch. We also went to the City Museum and the Meramec Caverns.

On the first day that we arrived, the Monday, we went to the school Saint Charles West, where we go donuts and met the principle of their school. We also got free school tshirts. we all went to the Rec. Plex with our exchange hosts. The Rec. Plex was a place with an iceskating rink, a swimming pool and a basketball court.

On Tuesday we went to the jail, this was an amazing experience because we got to go inside the jail and we came face to face with real criminals. They showed us how the prisoners lived in jail and the different things the prisoners do everyday. They also told us the meals that the prisoners get everyday, for breakfast they get the usual food like cereal or toast, for lunch they get sandwiches, burgers, chips etc and for dinner they get pizza, pasta, potatoes or different meats etc. After the jail we went to the Foundry and got lunch, then after that we went to meet the mayor. She gave us a talk about what her duties as

mayor are and then we got to go see her office and we got photos taken with her.

On Wednesday we went to the Arch and went on the boat trip. When we were going to the top of the arch we were put into small trams that are supposed to fit 5 people per tram, and they take you to the top where you get out and there was windows so as you can look down on the city of Saint Louis. From the top of the arch there was some very exquisite views of the city and the Mississippi River. When we were finished taking photos, we all got back into the trams that we came up on and this time we had Mr. Spencer in our tram, as if the tram wasn't small enough! After our trip to the the arch we made our way to the boat. The boat trip took us up and down the river with a guide telling us about different things along the river and bridges that go across the river. The sun was out so that made the boat trip a lot better!

On Thursday we went to The City Museum, for a museum it was actually good. The museum wasn't like the normal boring museums this museum was like a park, on the roof there was a ferris wheel, an old school bus hanging off the building and two slides, one of which was 10 storeys long! On the other floors there was different exhibits and outside there was two aeroplanes and a ball pool for adults. Also, in the museum they have the world's largest pencil. On the ground floor there was tunnels that lead you to different parts of the museum, and apparently these tunnels can be hard to get out of! The next Monday we went to the Meramec Caverns the tour was a walk through caves that were discovered almost 100 years ago. The caves had stalagmites on the ground and stalactites on the ceiling. Throughout the cave there was a lot of different

lighting techniques, some of which made the rivers in the cave look deeper than what they actually were and some were just coloured lights in different parts of the cave. At the end of the tour there was a light show which was projected onto the walls of the cave displaying different pictures relating to America, like the American flag and the bald eagle. On the way back to school we stopped at McDonalds for lunch. On Monday night we all went to a Halloween party organised by the Sister Cities, we all dressed up even Ms Coll and Mr Spencer! Shannon and her exchange student won best costume, dressed as a hunter and deer. After the costume contest, the band started playing some music and we danced until the party was over.

On Friday and Tuesday we had to go to school. During school we had to give some classes a presentation about Ireland, our school and what we do in Ireland. We also had to go to classes with our exchange student. After school and during the weekend we had to spend time with our host families, so most evenings after school my host and I went to different places to eat as we don't have the same restaurants in Ireland some of which were; Taco Bell, Dunkin' Donuts and ChikFilA. We also went shopping and we went to a trunk or treat, then a lock in at the church. At the weekend we went on a tour of Saint Louis and then we went to a pumpkin patch where we rode a camel and fed a kangaroo. After the pumpkin patch we went to Ted Drewes for frozen custard, which surprisingly was very nice!

The day we were leaving there were a lot of tears, we were all sad to leave America and our host families because we had such a good time and met so many nice, new people. When we were at the airport waiting on the plane, we found out it had been delayed for another hour, and we were all scared we would miss

our connecting flight from Philadelphia to Dublin. When we were on the flight to Philadelphia there was a lot of rain and turbulence. When we landed we had to get off the plane as fast as we could or we would have missed the plane to Dublin. So when we got off the plane we had to run as fast as we could, on our way to the gate to get the aeroplane people fell over suitcases and someones phone fell and broke. It was all very hectic! When we got on the plane there was a sigh of relief that we made it to the plane on time. When we landed in Dublin we got our bags and headed for the bus home. On the way we stopped for breakfast in Applegreens, afterwards we continued our journey home. Everybody was so tired that on the way home we all fell asleep, which unfortunately was caught on camera! When we arrived in Carndonagh we were greeted by our families, who were waiting impatiently on us to come home. The American exchange was a great experience and I would do it again any day!
